The University of Toronto invites applications, nominations and expressions of interest for the position of Director of the Munk School of Global Affairs, with the appointment to be effective July 1, 2011.

The University of Toronto is the largest and most prestigious research-intensive university in Canada. The University has more than 11,000 faculty and staff, some 70,000 students across three campuses, an annual budget of \$1.7 billion, including \$375 million in externally funded research and \$425 million in research funding in the affiliated teaching hospitals, and one of the premier research libraries in North America.

Against the backdrop of one of the world's most diverse cities, the Munk School of Global Affairs is a leading interdisciplinary academic centre for global issues that integrates research with graduate and undergraduate teaching and public education. It is home to the Asian Institute, the Centre for European, Russian, and Eurasian Studies, the Canada Centre for Global Security Studies, the Centre for the Study of the U.S., the Trudeau Centre for Peace and Conflict Studies and 25 other vibrant centres, institutes, and programs. Over 230 affiliated scholars from the humanities, the social sciences, management, law, medicine, and education call the School their intellectual home. The School has annual operating budgets in excess of \$2 million, \$60 million in endowments and over \$8 million in annual research funding. In 2009-10, the School received private and grant funding totaling \$85 million.

The Munk School has established a reputation for excellence in research, teaching, public engagement and innovative partnerships. Its newly launched Master of Global Affairs program provides future leaders with education in the core functional disciplines as well as a deep understanding of the broader architecture and the forces that shape the global system. Students are equipped with the skills they need to excel in their field of specialization—economy and markets, institutions, or civil society. An international internship with one of the School's top-tier partner institutions ensures that students develop key strategic, policy, and management skills and gain critical global experience.
